### World Travelers Call LTW & VV Home

We have “residents” from Italy, France, Spain, Russia, northern Africa, England, Australia, South Africa. Unfortunately, I am talking about the obnoxious residents called weeds. Invasive weeds spread quickly, stifle our natives, reduce habitat for native animals, rot our oaks, and some are fire hazards. We have a plethora of these weeds, but we also have a plethora of weed fighters in the community who have been particularly diligent in their fight over the years. Fighters, who maintain their own property and keep the weeds from spreading to surrounding properties, are especially needed.

Here is a quick rundown on 7 of the most noxious weeds: French Broom (*Genista monspessulana*), Bull Thistle (*Cirsium vulgare*), Italian Thistle (*Carduus pycnocephalus*), Yellow Star Thistle (*Centaurea solstitialis*), Cape Ivy (*Delairea odorata*), Ivy (*Hedera sp.*), Eucalyptus (*Eucalyptus sp.*). What is SO detrimental about these particular plants? Let me count the ways.

- 1) French Broom – produces copious amounts of seed toxic to wildlife, forms dense monospecific stands, burns readily spreading fire to tree canopy layer.
- 2) Bull Thistle – seed viability is high, often above 90%, large plants can produce tens of thousands of seeds, spines are nasty (editor’s note).
- 3) Italian Thistle – dominates sites and excludes natives, one plant can produce 20,000 seeds, can spread grass fires to tree canopies.
- 4) YellowStar Thistle – reduces soil moisture, seeds can survive up to 10 years in the soil. (It has been partially controlled on Ramona Rd. and in VV, but will spread again if not eradicated.)
- 5) Cape Ivy – grows at a phenomenal rate, even a ½” stem fragment can root, extremely difficult to eradicate due to underground roots or stolon’s.
- 6) Ivy – causes build up of debris and moisture when it climbs tree trunks causing the bark to rot, vines can live over 400 years, creates dense cover as it spreads inhibiting other plants.
- 7) Eucalyptus – increases risk of catastrophic fires, leaves and shedding bark inhibits growth of other plants, hazardous because of branch failure.

This wet soil time of year is an opportune time to rid our yards and hiking areas of these other “residents.” Along with ridding ourselves of the weeds, there is also the opportunity to encourage our natives. By not picking the native flowers or digging up the bulbs or stepping on them when we create a trail shortcut, we can encourage them to go to seed and spread their native beauty.
