What's a Radio To Do?

FRS vs. GMRS vs NOAA radio's: A brief description of each and why you need them. *FRS & GMRS Radio's:*

FRS and GMRS are types of two-way radios (aka 'Walkie Talkies') which, for the most part, share the same frequencies and are interchangeable. The range, or distance they transmit, of these radios depends on line-of-site and topography. In LTW/VV because of the hilly terrain, it can be as low as ¹/₄ to ¹/₂ mile. We have tested both FRS and GMRS radios, and, generally, you can listen to, and talk with, anyone in your District/Neighborhood with our recommended radios. Reaching out further depends on the topography of your location.

Refer to your Community Resource Guide to know which District/Neighborhood you are in and the correct frequency (channel + code) to tune to. In an emergency, your LTW District or VV Neighborhood Leader will communicate with you, and you with your Leader, via your FRS/GMRS radio on the channel assigned to your area. Our phone lines may be down or 911 will be inundated with calls (a likely scenario after a large earthquake), so your radio may be your only means of communication. We recommend that you keep them charged up, since one never knows when the emergency will happen.

We have tested and recommend the Motorola T402 FRS radio or any Motorola T4xx FRS radio which come in packs of 2. In the interest of safety, we recommend that every household have a set (2) of these radios. FRS radios are less expensive and do not have the FCC licensing issues that the GMRS radios have, thus FRS is our choice. See below for recommended FRS models which also include a NOAA weather channel feature for receiving incoming NOAA information.



NOAA Weather Radio (aka NOAA Radio or NWR Radio):

NOAA Weather Radio (NWR) is a nationwide network of radio stations broadcasting continuous weather information directly from the nearest National Weather Service office, however, you **cannot broadcast out** (talk) to anyone on the NWR. NWR broadcasts official Weather Service warnings, watches, forecasts and other hazard information 24 hours a day, 7 days per week. NWR also broadcasts warning and post-event

information for all types of hazards including natural (such as earthquakes, and wildfires), environmental (such as chemical spills), and public safety (such as Amber alerts or 911 telephone outages).

There are two ways you can listen to the NOAA radio frequencies:

1. Purchase a dedicated radio (see example below) that is made specifically to listen to the NOAA radio frequencies but not to talk to anyone. Most of these radios include a way to alert the listener with an alarm and/or flashing light to make you aware of a specific emergency taking place in your area. The NOAA radio is plugged into a wall socket but also has internal batteries that allow the radio to function for several days even after a power outage. If you have one, set yours up to use Channel 5 for best reception.



Recommended NWR: Midland WR120/WR120EZ

2. Purchase an FRS or GMRS 'Walkie Talkie' that has two-way communication capabilities which also includes a weather channel feature to listen to the NOAA Weather Radio frequencies. The T4xx series of Motorola FRS radios, which we recommend for emergency preparedness, includes this feature. For example, with the simple click of a button, the Motorola T402 FRS radio will switch from two-way communication within the neighborhood to a receiver for NOAA Weather Radio broadcasts.

Thanksgiving for the Life of Bjorn Conrad

Long time resident (1975), Bjorn Conrad passed away on Dec. 14 after a short battle with cancer. He led a varied and rich life all the way from being born in Sweden, immigrating with his family to New Jersey, living on a chicken farm, to attending MIT. After taking a job at Lockheed in California, he went on to earn a PhD at Stanford University. NASA Ames benefited from his creative spirit, but SRI is where he really came into his own working in analysis and simulation of transit control systems. He founded his own company and is the primary author of OnTrack simulation suite which has helped build and improve transit systems nationwide. Bjorn was known on the courts and at the pools of Alpine Hills. He enjoyed all sports, even into his 70's. His family will miss debating with him and his willingness to join in on any adventure, whether by plane, train, bus, or Mini Cooper.
